LETTER FROM THE MINISTRY TEAM

My dear friends, do you like stories? I have to tell you my secret: I love them. A good story is the best way to understand our own life. This story is just for you and I hope you will enjoy it.

The Wisdom of the Frog

Conceited and very lazy, the frog sat in the sun all day long. Lying on an old lily pad he complained of his poor lot in life, which he thought was unfair. He loved stories and day dreaming. He was convinced that one day a beautiful princess would kiss him and then he would turn into a prince more handsome than in a fairytale. He just waited for the moment when the magic spell thrown on him would be broken and for him to be saved from the monotonous and meaningless life that he was living. Until that day he tried to fill the time how he could. He wasn't interested in the concerns of his neighbours by the puddle. All they seemed to do was to run after a few insects, that did nothing more than to ease their hunger. They neglected their beauty sleep, waking up very early in the morning, jumping all over the place and making a deafening noise, you wanted to be as far away as possible! The frog would have moved long time ago, if would not have required so much effort on his part. But things were not simple at all, so he decided to continue his miserable life. He thought his beauty was wasted on a puddle, where he was not appreciated as he thought he should be. 
Giving

"Just as you excel in everything - by faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness, and in your love for us - see that you also excel in the grace of giving". 2 Corinthians 8:7-15

If you have been following the debates between the political parties over the past few weeks, there has been a lot of discussion about our taxes. Money is at the top of the agenda for the government. But we don't like to talk a lot about giving in the church, yet Jesus taught more about money than he did about heaven! Giving to God isn't a matter of obligations and percentages. That's how we relate to the Inland Revenue. We carefully calculate our taxes using charts. Very few people pay their taxes cheerfully. Most give "reluctantly" and "under compulsion". But giving to God is not like that. Giving to God is a matter of the heart. We give to God out of love, and gratitude, and thankfulness for what He has done for us. We give to God as an act of faith and an act of worship.

"Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." --2 Corinthians 9:7 In the present climate, costs are rising, and the church is not immune from that. Maintenance, the cost of heating our churches and the cost of ministry have all risen, and we rely on the generosity of our church members and community to continue to support the church. We are also grateful for those who have considered leaving a legacy in their will. We have benefited greatly from our supporters in the past through their kindness and generosity in leaving a bequest. Bishop Rob (the Bishop of Penrith, and acting Bishop of Carlisle) has written to all churches to express his thanks for the support given for the ministry across the Diocese. As a parish, we contributed £57,770 from our churches toward the ministry costs in 2023 and are on track to fulfil our commitment to raise this year £60,940. We have made the bold decision to raise this to £63177 a rise of 3.6% in 2025. But we need your help and support.

If you can help with regular, or a one-off gift towards the maintenance and ministry of our churches, please have a word with one of our treasurers or churchwardens.

Confirmation

For people who have been baptised as an infant, confirmation marks the point in your Christian journey at which you publicly affirm the faith into which you were baptised and your intention to live your life as a close follower of Jesus Christ. At your confirmation, you confirm the promises your parents and godparents made on your behalf at your baptism about your commitment to a journey of faith in Jesus Christ. In confirming this faith, you are becoming a member of the local and worldwide Christian family. In confirmation, we recall the promises made at baptism, we thank God for his gift of life and are publicly acknowledge his love. We acknowledge that we all need to turn away from selfishness and evil and accept God's offer of a new start. Confirmation is available to people from the age of 11 years old upwards and are in secondary school (from Sept 2024). There is no upper age limit! There will be a course to prepare for Confirmation beginning in September led by Revd. Bryan Rothwell. The Confirmation Service will be arranged with the Bishop in the Spring of 2025. If you are thinking about being confirmed and would like to join with others exploring more about the Christian faith in the confirmation preparation course, please contact (by 31st August 2024) Revd. - · be baptised (Christened). If you have not been baptised, we can arrange this either before or as part of the Confirmation Service
- · attend Church regularly
- · attend the confirmation course
- · be able to demonstrate your own personal faith in Jesus Christ







Community Purchase of Blencogo Village Hall - Fundraising update.

Since July we have had two successful small grant applications to Cumbria Community Foundation (£5k) and Cumberland Community Panel (£3k). Unfortunately, the 'big' application to the Community Ownership Fund (application over £70k) is deferred since the General Election. We will continue preparing this bid in the hope that the final window for applications will open later in the summer, but we are also looking at other grant sources. It has been really encouraging to see so many of our community & local businesses offering financial pledges of support. The figure as of 9th August 2024, including the grants above exceeds £22,500. The total amount we hope to raise within the local community is a minimum of £25,000 but we are aiming for £30,000 (possibly £35k??). The more money that is raised locally the better we score in the COF grant application. We are preparing a large raffle with big prizes which you will see and hear more about over the summer. If you know someone/ a business that would be able to provide a prize please let us know. A big thank you to all of you who have supported the Village Hall so far either by writing a letter of support or making a financial pledge. 



most from and how best to look after.


